

#### Chairman's Statement



Welcome to the first Annual Report for the Rural Aberdeenshire LEADER Programme.

Following a successful launch in June 2008 the Local Action Group (LAG), a partnership comprising a wide range of rural stakeholders, has considered an array of projects across Aberdeenshire that reflect the key aims and objectives of the LAG Strategy which are Revitalising Communities and having a Progressive Rural Economy.

Rural and coastal communities throughout Aberdeenshire are benefiting from a diverse range of projects brought forward by local groups, organisations and public sector partners.

One of the real benefits of partnership working is the high level and breadth of matched funding that is being levered in towards LEADER Projects. This clearly demonstrates the innovative approach of LEADER in delivering rural development support through a local decision making process.

Having completed four assessment rounds to 30 June 2009 a total of 46 projects have been approved by the LAG that will receive LEADER funding totalling £1.36m. The LAG Partnership is to be complimented on its enthusiasm and proactive stance in making LEADER happen in Aberdeenshire.

Throughout the year LEADER has been promoted at a series of events and with many projects now underway, and some completed, it is evident the programme is working very well in Aberdeenshire.

LEADER is contributing to the development of community facilities, cultural and natural heritage projects and also feasibility studies so that groups can take the valuable step in identifying the viability of larger projects.

In addition LEADER in Aberdeenshire is supporting events and festivals which this year are directly linked to Homecoming 2009. As a result LEADER is helping to promote local food and craft products and initiatives that focus on the cultural heritage of our rural communities while stimulating the local economy through increased visitor numbers attending events.

Instrumental in the successful delivery of LEADER has been the staff and their efforts must be recognised.

The future suggests more projects are on the horizon and the LAG looks forward to considering these.

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#### 1. Introduction

LEADER is a key element within the Scotland Rural Development Programme (SRDP) 2007-2013. LEADER in Aberdeenshire aims to increase capacity of rural community and business networks through projects and initiatives that deliver community benefit and reflect one or both overarching LEADER themes, namely Revitalising Communities and Progressive Rural Economy.

LEADER is funded by the European Agricultural Fund for Rural Development (EAFRD) and the Scottish Government with match funding from the public and private sectors.

The Rural Aberdeenshire Local Action Group (LAG) which delivers the programme was formed in August 2007. A bid for LEADER funds was submitted to the Scottish Government in October 2007. The Rural Aberdeenshire LAG was awarded LEADER funds of £3.36 million and the programme was launched on 27 June 2008 and will close on 31 December 2013.

Four funding rounds have been undertaken in the first year's operation of the Rural Aberdeenshire LEADER programme. Forty six projects have been approved to 30 June 2009 across Aberdeenshire with total grant commitment of £1.36 million towards eligible costs of £4 million and overall costs in the region of £6 million.

#### 2. Local Action Group

#### 2.1 LAG Partnership

The LAG is a partnership of 14 member organisations with an equal mix between the public and private sectors. More than 50% of the organisations represented on the LAG are also members of Aberdeenshire Community Planning Partnership. A list of LAG member organisations is attached as Appendix 1 of this report.

Aberdeenshire Council is the lead partner in the LAG and the Council acts as banker for the LAG through drawdown of EAFRD and domestic funds and disbursement of LEADER grants. A Service Level Agreement between the Scottish Government and Aberdeenshire Council sets out the roles and responsibilities of the lead partner.

#### 2.2 Coherent LAG Area

The area covered by the Rural Aberdeenshire LAG is the Aberdeenshire local authority area excluding the area within the Cairngorms National Park and eight settlements each of which have populations greater than 5,000. The population in the LAG area is approximately 148,000 and includes rural communities and settlements with populations up to 5,000.

The underpinning synergy across the region is the vision for vibrant, inclusive, rural communities, combined with sustainable environmental credentials, in terms of resource use, energy efficiency, landscape and biodiversity, against a backdrop of economically viable rural businesses and rural services.

#### 2.3 Population and Economy

The LAG area is estimated to be 4,819 sq km. The population density in the LAG area 31 is per sq km, reflecting the rural nature of the region. Population density varies across the LAG area, from 12 persons per square kilometre in Marr in the west of the LAG area, to 77 in the more populated areas, such as Garioch.

The LAG area includes around 50 settlements with populations ranging from 432 in Cuminestown to around 4,500 in Turriff and Huntly. Approximately 70,000, or 47% of the LAG population live in rural areas outwith settlements.

Traditionally, the LAG area has been economically dependent upon the primary sectors including agriculture, forestry and fishing, with value added activity generated through processing activities related to the primary sector.

Tourism is important economically for communities throughout the LAG area. The area's appeal is based on the high value environment, the landscape, heritage, culture and people. There is an opportunity through LEADER to market the overall tourism product and up-skill the workforce enhancing employment opportunities and stimulating rural business networks.

In recent years the number of rural facilities in Aberdeenshire has fallen across most areas with significant decline in banks, petrol stations, shops and post offices. Reduction in these services is seen as critical in terms of impact on quality of life and maintaining the viability of self-contained rural communities. LEADER has a pivotal role to identify and deliver innovative solutions for rural communities.

#### 3. LAG Strategy

#### 3.1 Strategic Objectives

The Rural Aberdeenshire LAG Strategy was developed taking account of the European Commission's three main axes within the Rural Development Regulation (1698/2005):

- Improving the competitiveness of the agricultural and forestry sectors
- Improving the environment and countryside through land management
- Improving quality of life through diversification of economic activity

and also the priority outcomes for the SRDP:

- Improved business viability
- Enhanced biodiversity and landscape
- Improved water quality
- Tackle climate change
- Support thriving rural communities

#### 3.2 Rural Aberdeenshire Key Priorities

LEADER in Rural Aberdeenshire focuses on two overarching themes, namely:

- Revitalising Communities
- Progressive Rural Economy



The Aberdeenshire LAG has been a big success thus far, funding a variety of innovative community projects. The LAG has worked well with the Grampian RPAC as our links on community type proposals have assisted projects towards grant awards under LEADER and RDC-RP.



#### 3.4 Delivery of LAG Strategy & Business Plan

From launch of LEADER in Aberdeenshire to 30 June 2009 it is evident that the LAG Strategy is being delivered, demonstrated by:

- 100% of projects approved in the period relate to one or both of the overarching themes: Revitalising Communities and/or Progressive Rural Economy.
- 100% of projects approved relate to one or more of the key priorities the LAG strategy is focusing on.
- The LAG Partnership is strong, supportive and cohesive and not averse to taking bold decisions on innovative projects.
- Continuing demand and capacity of participants to bring forward new projects.

In light of above, Scottish Government has been advised that there are no proposed changes to the LAG Strategy and Business Plan in the first year of the programme. The Strategy and Business Plan will be kept under review in relation to the budget, regional priorities and LAG membership etc.

#### 4. Programme Delivery

#### 4.1 Year 1: 27 June 2008 to 30 June 2009

Applications are assessed in quarterly cycles. Once submitted, applications are checked for eligibility and links to the LEADER Strategic themes and priorities. The applications and individual summary reports are considered in full by the Project Assessment Committee (PAC) and scored against a set of criteria selected by the LAG.

PAC representation, a sub group of the LAG, includes the lead partner, business, community, enterprise, environment and land based interests. The PAC makes recommendations to the LAG. Final decision on applications is made by the LAG. It should be noted that the PAC has delegated authority to approve projects with grant applications up to £5,000.

LEADER is progressing really well in Aberdeenshire. Projects such as the Forest Education Initiative and Saving Scotland's Red Squirrels are delivering real and tangible benefits to the people of Grampian. LEADER has part funded a project officer for the Forest Education Initiative who is actively encouraging better use of Grampian's fantastic woodland resource as a learning tool for schools and communities. These projects are ensuring young people growing up in our communities are developing key life skills such as teamwork, leadership, confidence and much more. The Saving our Red Squirrels project is vital to safeguard north Scotland's red squirrel population the officer is encouraging active management of woodlands for squirrels with the help of Grampian's landowners, public and private agencies and of course the community.

One of the positive outcomes of the application and approval process is the strong buy-in and partnership approach towards projects. This is clearly demonstrated in the level of match funding that has been levered in. The LEADER intervention rate on total eligible costs currently stands at 33%. A table summarising the range of match funding per round is attached as Appendix 2. Approved projects are listed in Appendix 3. A map detailing location of projects is included overleaf.

To deliver the programme, Scottish Government made a 7% advance payment of the budget to the LAG. These funds are held by Aberdeenshire Council. Thirty two grant claims/progress reports have been processed to 30 June resulting in grant disbursement of £147,270. Three claims to 30 June totalling £163,033 relating to administration costs and project grant payments have been submitted to the Scottish Government for further drawdown of LEADER funds.

#### 7. Looking Ahead

#### 7.1 Calendar for 2010

It is proposed the quarterly cycle of LAG meetings continues in 2010. A Timetable for LAG meetings will be confirmed and uploaded to the website by December 2009.

#### 7.2 Budget Monitoring

Analysis of budget commitment, grant disbursement, drawdown of LEADER funds from Scottish Government and balance of funds available will continue. Based on current and projected level of demand, future budget constraints could be an issue, resulting in the need to research and identify any additional sources of funding for the Rural Aberdeenshire LEADER Programme.

A watching brief will be maintained on European Fisheries Fund (EFF) Axis 4 which will be targeted at fishing communities. This funding may be delivered through the LEADER approach.

#### 7.3 Project Monitoring

As the number of projects completing increases, project monitoring will be undertaken in 2010. This will feed into monitoring of outputs and outcomes which will be required by Scottish Government.

#### 7.4 Future Rural Development Policy

Looking to the future (2014 to 2020), there is a need for LAGs to be involved and participate in the discussion process with the European Commission and the Scottish Government in relation to delivery methodology for future Rural Development Funding Programmes. Experience at present in Aberdeenshire suggests that local and regional delivery based on a partnership approach such as LEADER is a useful approach to adopt.

Improved Scolty paths will link to the strategic Deeside Way.

The Portsoy Salmon Bothy is a listed building which was restored in 2008 part-funded by the European Regional Development Fund. The opening of this facility will bring additional tourist revenue to Portsoy and the surrounding area, while creating new facilities for local user groups.

The LAG partnership comprises representatives from community, business, land based, youth, and women's groups in the area, together with representatives from public sector organisations.






















#### **LAG Area**
